
2023 Sabi Wabi 'Nomu' – Syrah – Hunter Valley, NSW

At some point in the past, wine went from being the drink of the people, grown and made by folks with dirt under their fingernails and a ruddy smile on their sunburnt faces, and turned into an exclusive club comprised of snooty bow-tie-wearing types scorning all those who didn't know their Claret from their Carignan.

No thanks. We're all about sharing and enjoying without judgement, and our team can't wait to show you their favourite drops, which hopefully will become yours too!

But we know that some still like to order their tipple without the chat, and we're fine with that too. For those people

we present our favourite picks below as a quick guide of what we think is bloody delicious on our list right now...

Koerner, 2023 "Gullyview" — *Riesling* — Damon and Jonathan Koerner, Clare Valley, SA 117

Ok so this is a dangerously smashable Riesling from the Koerner boys. Super intense and refreshing on a warm spring evening. Tonnes of mouth-watering brightness7 and cool minerality, just popping with green apple and a hint of mango. These vines were planted in 1974 and are really hitting their stride.

Dr. Edge, 2023 'Chardennui' — *Chardonnay, Riesling* — Peter Dredge, Tamar Valley, TAS 92

This is a blend of three different Chardonnay vineyards from Tassie. There's a touch of skins to add texture and tiny splash of Riesling for some extra fruity fun. This is a fun and vibrant take on a modern Aussie Chardonnay that is clean bright and fresh with texture and gorgeous flavours of lime lemon orange through to pear and peach. Once you taste you'll be back for more but hurry as there is very little.

Las Vino, 2022 'CBDB' – Chenin Blanc — Nicolas Peterkin, Great Southern, WA 166

"So let me tell you how this is: it's a summer's day, by the ocean, perhaps Margaret River, a whiff of orange blossom and thyme with sea spray. There's more: lemon verbena, and Odie's wood oil, while the palate is salty, tangy, juicy and mouthwatering with a slip of texture, fine acidity all the way through. It is superbly balanced and so, so good." - Not our words, but those of Jane Faulkner (Halliday Wine Companion). No wonder she gave it 96 points!

Moondarra, 2018 'Samba Side' – Pinot Noir – Neil Prentice, Gippsland, VIC

Neil likes to make his wines with what he calls "funkosité", saying: "I think it describes our approach to making Pinot Noir perfectly. Moondarra Pinots are not missionary position Pinot Noirs that are technically perfect. Rather they reflect our 'crazy-horse-trash' soul. They're cloudy, 'reverse-cowgirl' styled wines with flannelette texture and introspective soul." (Pronounced; fun-Cos-itY)

Aóri Wines 2022 – Kotsifali Tinto – Aimilios Andrei, Crete, Greece

Aimilios Andrei is a young sommelier turned wine maker from the mountainous Chania region of Crete. There, in the mountains, he has discovered and brought back to life old Kotsifali bush vines, planted over a hundred years ago at 800m altitude. Having tasted his wines we truly believe the sky is the limit for these vines and this variety as the soft, crunchy tannins, red cherry brightness and violets gives us serious Sicily meets Nebbiolo vibes.

PETILLANT NATUREL

Wines are bottled before they finish primary fermentation. As they finish, the carbon dioxide that would normally be expelled is trapped in the bottle. Unfiltered, fruity, and often a bit wild.

Riesling is not only one of the greatest joys of the known world, it is also one of the most maligned and misunderstood.

So in the interests of humanity and the patrons of this bar, we present some simple, objective and irrefutable facts on this most refreshing and delicious of beverages.

- 1. Riesling is the best drink in this bar.
- 2. Riesling is the best drink in any bar.
- 3. Up until the early 20th Century Rieslings were the most expensive wines in the world.
- 4. Today, Riesling is the best value wine in the universe.
- 5. Riesling runs the entire spectrum of the sweetness spectrum from bone dry to super sugary.
- 6. Made correctly, a Riesling's sweetness and acidity should be in perfect harmony.
- (That means sweeter styles should have loads of acid, keeping them super-fresh.)
- 7. Sweeter styles that lack this acidity will never be seen in this bar and in fact have no right to call themselves Rieslings. They bring shame and sadness to all true Riesling lovers.
- 8. Sweeter Rieslings are typically low in alcohol, meaning you can drink even more
- (which, given how easy they are to drink, is a huge bonus).
- 9. There are several unconfirmed reports of Rieslings curing the terminally ill. Seriously.
- 10. Australian Riesling is continually diversifying and improving the best are among the best in the world.

CHARDONNAY

Ok, we get it. There are those of you out there who identify with "ABC" crowd ("Anything But Chardonnay") and for whatever regretful experience you've had with a flabby, overly buttery, bulk-made incarnation of this wonderfully versatile grape, we can only sympathise.

The truth though, is that unlike it's picky Burgundian neighbour Pinot Noir, Chardonnay is the easy-going, cooperative mate who just wants everyone to get along. Equally at home in high society as down the local pub, it'll grow just about anywhere and can take most things that you throw at it. Aussie Chardonnay is now in its Goldilocks phase, where it has flavour but also freshness – bold and svelte in equal measure.

In the hands of the best winemakers, like those below, it can transcend the ordinary into something truly magnificent.

SAUVIGNON BLANC, SEMILLON AND CHENIN BLANC

If you type "Sauvignon Blanc" into google, one of the prompts is "is Sauvignon Blanc only from New Zealand?". Such is the explosion in popularity of this aromatic grape varietal since the surge in exports from Marlborough in the mid 2000's that, for some, it has become synonymous with the land of the long white cloud.

But 'Savvy B' can trace it's roots (that's a vine pun) much further back, to the Loire Valley and Bordeaux (wine historians cannot seem to decide which), along with it's friends, neighbours and sometime-blending-partners Semillon and Chenin Blanc.

ORANGE WINES

Why 'Orange' wine?

1. It's a delicious beverage that has an orange colour (although in reality the colour can range from yellow to orange, to brown, to pink).

2. It's made from grapes (white ones). And never from oranges.

3. It's not usually from the town of Orange, but there's no reason it couldn't be.

4. It is made by leaving the white grape skins in contact with the pressed juice (in much the same way that red wines are made by macerating the red grape skins with the clear juice to get their red colour).

5. The maceration tends to give the wine more texture and an aroma and flavour that is at least different to white wine, and is in many cases arguably superior because of the added complexity from the skins.

6. Some wine regions are defined by their production of Orange wine, particularly Georgia, and Italy's North-Eastern Friuli. Nowhere locally has yet taken this mantle. But there is still time. We'd put money on the Adelaide Hills.

ROSÉ

Rosé is wine made from red grapes that are pressed so lightly that only a touch of colour is extracted from the grape skins. It's actually fairly rare for rosé to be made by adding red and white wine – that tends to only ever happen at teenage birthday parties and in the cellars of natural winemakers.

The amount of maceration the skins have with the juice in the wine – along with the variety of the grapes used – is the main factor that determines the colour of the wine – and despite what anyone tells you, more colour in no way signifies more sweetness. And for the record, no rosés with residual sugar will ever land on this list. They are, without exception, gross.

RED WINE

For whatever reason, a lot of people seem to think that the ideal red wine temperature is... room temperature —white wine belongs in the fridge, sure, but red wine belongs in...the room? But room temperature is typically around 20 degrees, and in the Sydney summer those temps can sky-rocket, even with the wonders of air-con, whereas the ideal serving temperature for red wine is anywhere between 13 and 18 degrees. So, yeah: room temp is no bueno. But don't let those numbers throw you off. We're not asking you to get a thermometer out and stick it into your wine bottle—that would be weird. This should be pretty intuitive stuff. You know what room temperature feels like because, chances are, you're currently in...a room. And your red wine should taste and feel at least a little bit cooler than that. Light reds generally prefer lower serving temperatures and so below we've got a selection of our favourites.

Australia has always had a love affair with French grape varieties. Statistically, our top ten most-grown grapes are all French, with Syrah (or good ol' Aussie Shiraz as it's known here), Chardonnay and Cabernet Sauvignon dominating our production.

Yet most of our Australian grape-growing climates are more akin to Bolgheri than Burgundy. More similar to Sicily than Sancerre. Our warm seasons and plentiful sunlight are motivating more growers and winemakers to look to our Mediterranean cousins for inspiration in recent years and, with climate change, we expect to see a lot more Tempranillos and Teroldegos in Australia's future!
